The Wonder of Nature



APAY staffs Mr. Kohei Yamada (GS), Ms. Cristina Dalope (ES), Mr. Bruce Van Voorhis (ICF Coordinator) and Youth Assembly Chair Mr. Oliver Loke sampled some seed planting in Penang during their meeting with the local host committee last June 23-25.

At the end of June, I was in Penang to finalize the arrangements with the Host Committee for the forthcoming Youth Assembly and General Assembly. I enjoyed this trip more as I learned and experienced more about the local food, culture and the people. I would like to share some of feelings and experiences about Penang especially with those who are not sure whether to attend the Assembly or not.

It was the middle of the Durian season. The Durian is known as the 'King of Fruits' in Malaysia and Penang has some of the best species there. It has a very unique and very strong smell...yes..very strong smell. You will have to make a very quick decision to stay to try it or to get away from the very strong smell. There are people who like it very much and there are those who dislike it's smell. Most hotels, including our Penang YMCA, do not allow durians in its premises. Many people buy them and eat them on the spot. They do not like to bring them home, as their cars will stink with the smell for at least a week. It was the peak season when I was in Penang, and the season will end around the time of our Assembly. I hope you will get a chance to try this fruit during the Assembly.

On my way to an exposure site for the Assembly. I stopped by a village on a hillside and saw many durian trees full of fruits. Durians grow on tall trees and the drop naturally once they are ripe. Thus one has to be very careful when walking along durian trees lest one drops on vou. I was told that durians usually drop early in the morning or around 3pm. True enough, I heard them dropping. The size of a durian is like that of volleyball. It has a hard shell with sharp thorns. There are durians that taste sweet and some tastes bitter. In the village I had a variety of durians and we drank lots of water after eating them as it is considered a 'hearty' fruit. I learned that I could remove the durian smell from my mouth by drinking water with the shell and the smell from my hands and fingers by washing my hands with it. Truly it worked!

We visited a farm run by a Christian group comprising a pastor with 8 young men who were formerly drug addicts. The farm served as their rehabilitation place. The farm was planted with fruits and other nature's products, including durians. They start work each morning at 5am and pick up fruits and bring them to the

village for sale. They work hard, eat together and they sleep in a little hut on the mountain slope. They study the Bible together. I was very impressed by this way of missionary work on the mountain slope, and the attitude of these ex-drug addicts. I feel the YMCA can do more of this type of work. This experience further enhanced my understanding of missionary work without having to flash the word Christianity.

The 18th Assembly will be held in city of Georgetown, which has been accorded Heritage status by UNESCO. The city has many colonial buildings as well as local buildings that have been kept intact as heritage for hundreds of years. The venue of our Assembly is in the centre of these heritage buildings. You will not only enjoy visiting these heritage buildings but you will also enjoy the variety of local food and enjoy observing the varied cultures of the Malays, Chinese and Indians. The Malaysian culture is truly a mixture of its heritage, its races and its religions. Its tropical nature creates beautiful greenery, and a variety of fruits and vegetables. Spending a few days here in Penang, I really felt "Malaysia, Truly Asia"

GCE Sub-Regional Implementation Takes Off

The first Sub-regional Global Citizenship Education Training of Trainers took place last July. First, it was held in Makati Philippines for South East Asia last 4-10 July; then at Kerala, India for South Asia last 26-31 July. A total of forty-three (43) young volunteers, staffs and leaders participated in both events from the YMCAs of Bangladesh, Cambodia, East Timor, Hong Kong, Japan, Korea, Sri Lanka, Thailand and hosts' countries, India and the Philippines

The training program was composed of input presentations, skills training workshops, and community exposures. The trainings were facilitated by a roster of trainers' expert on the fields

Community Exposure is one of the integral components of these trainings. Both sub-regions had different ways of conducting this. For the South East Asia Region, participants went to three grass-root communities: Coalition of Services for the Elderly, Kalingap Marikina Watershed, and Peoples' and Organization Group. While for South Asia: participants were divided to visit 4 zones of Kerala. In each zone consisted of an itinerary that led them to places where pressing issues emanate. The trainings ended with the presentation of the participants' Action Plans that will bring this training into the next step – mainstreaming of the GCE/ GC programs down to the local.

To share some of the reflections from the participants:

"Recently I visited Kerala to attend GCE ToT organized by APAY. At first I thought it would be like this: a person comes, gives a long speech and then goes away. The entire training module was interactive based and the resource persons know what they were talking. It was enriching experience for. This program has given me a direction and future of our Youth department and also a solution to our YMCA problem where we are lacking

Youth involvement in YMCA's Activities and Programs. Though the task in hand is way too big but this will be a great step for all of us in trying to accomplish the Mission of YMCA "in extension of God's kingdom amongst Young People"- Paul Daniel Lakra, 26 (YMCA New Delhi, India)

"I'm very thankful to be part of the Global Citizenship Education (GCE) Training of Trainers (ToT) in Makati. This training taught me that globalization involves not just positive effects but also negative impacts on the lives of individuals. But more than that, GCE has sparked in me a burning passion to better the world, that is, to act on the issues that directly damage the community where I belong. GCE also opened new doors for me to meet other local and international vouth movers in the YMCA. The other participants would always remind me that I am not alone in this advocacy. We may be doing simple steps in our own little ways but the results will lead to a big difference in the world. As it was once said, "United we stand, Divided we fall." ICF ~ Dialogue in Diversity

Twenty-four participants from seven countries gathered at the YMCA Training Center in Dhaka, Bangladesh, from July 9 to 24, 2011, for the interfaith workshop Dialogue in Diversity hosted by the National Council of YMCAs of Bangladesh and conducted by Interfaith Cooperation Forum (ICF), a joint program of the Asia and Pacific Alliance of YMCAs (APAY) and the Christian Conference of Asia (CCA).. The participants included Muslims, Buddhists, Sikhs and Christians from Cambodia, India, Laos, Pakistan and Thailand as well as Bangladesh. For the first time, an ICF program also included people from outside of Asia as seven participants from the YMCA in England took part as increasingly people of different faiths are finding themselves living in the same English community, such as

A Reflection from India

Kohei Yamada shares his interaction with Most Rev. Dr. Philipose Mar Chrisostem Metropolitan Marthoma Church, India last July 29, 2011 at his residence in Kerala, with GCE ToT participants

The bishop is 96 years old and we had a meeting with him for an hour. He asked us questions and we answered, then he questioned further. In this way he tried to explain his views of life, YMCA and young people.

He explained the Good Samaritan's story and he said that the robber took the clothes of the victims to meet his needs. He thinks those who passed by without helping the victims were worse robbers than the actual robber. He asked us, "How about the YMCA?"

He said that YMCA should pray. Why do we pray? Does God change me because of my prayer? What do you pray for? He said that we do not need to pray for the others. Rather we pray for what we do in this world. Then discover the real needs of the poor. We should not judge according to our own scales. Go and meet people and find out what is really needed. In this way, we give ourselves to the poor.

ecumenical organization providing the support to anybody and has always put people together regardless of religions, castes, sex, and status. In London, India YMCA built a hostel for students and travelers. Those students became interested in church because of the YMCA. God created our world good. But is the world good? We need to work for peace and harmony.

The old always looks back the past and talk about the past. The youth look at and bring future visions to present. Only youth can help our future society. The youth can transform the world. Then what is the wish for the world? "Love, Peace and Joy of God".

Who goes to heaven? You should be better than who you are today. That is the way to heaven and this effort lasts till God wants you to be there. He gave us a story of twin babies in the mother's womb. One says, "we die after 10 months", and the other says, "no, we will come out of mother for the new world". Accordingly, birth is death and death is the birth.

After his speech, one participant mentioned. YMCA is not the building but it is the people who build the buildings. But YMCA is too busy to maintain the buildings. We should have realized the realities that many YMCAs and their staff have been in such position.

In this brief meeting with 14 youth and staff members of GCE TOT program, those questions and his ideas were shared. It was short but we felt somehow enlightened with his wisdom and the way he told us the faiths and mission of YMCAs. We should be proud of what we have done in the last 160 years, but we should always pray and ask what we can further do to the people and youth in need. And we always be questioning what the real needs are from those people themselves.

From 25 - 31 July 2011, an Ecumenical Creative Workshop of Youth and Students in Asia and the Pacific was held in Tao Fung Shan, Hong Kong. Focusing on the theme, "Justice and Peace Now!" the workshop provided opportunities to share stories and witness how Church youth leaders/ students demonstrate their creative talents as catalyst of peace. Resource persons gave input and used creative alternative art forms through bible studies, workshops and group discussions. As an output of this workshop, a resource book is being produced that would contain the creative works of the participants in mobilizing ecumenical youth groups in the grassroots communities and local Churches. The resource book will be used for the celebration of EASY Net Week this October and of the Asian Students and Youth Gathering (ASYG) in 2012.

MOVEMENT STRENGTHENING UPDATES — COUNTRY FOCUSED

CAMBODIA YMCA

We welcome YMCA of Long Beach in USA as the newest member of the Partners Support Group (PSG) of Cambodia YMCA (CYMCA). Mr. Bob Cabeza (Vice President of Long Beach YMCA, USA) and Ms Boon Chin Tan (Senior International Director from YMCA, USA) had visited CYMCA from 21-26 July 2011 to pursue the development of an exchange program

in Cambodia. For over one month in July and August, Mr. Richard Kaing, our Special Project Officer (SPO) stayed in Cambodia and served as Honorary General Secretary. During his stay, he provided on-the-job training to the staff to improve their skills and interpersonal relations. The first AGM (Annual General Meeting) was held and a membership campaign was organized to increase supporters of the new YMCA. The recruitment process for hiring the new General Secretary has been started and in the early September, this new position will be filled. Gradually and steadily, the YMCA has been strengthened with voung members and the continuing support from the PSG members

INDONESIA YMCA

Mr. Albert Chong, our Special Project Officer (SPO) for

Indonesia YMCA went to visit Surabaya and Malang for two weeks last June 2011. During his stay, we conducted PSG meeting and discussed the progress of the revitalization plan of Surabaya YMCA. The construction of Surabaya YMCA Kindergarten as the initial project of PSG has been completed with the support of PSG partners ~ Japan, Victoria YMCA, Metropolitan YMCA Singapore and YMCA USA. Likewise, two staff from Victoria YMCA, Australia visited Surabaya last June for training of Kindergarten teachers. The project provides a new hope for Surabaya YMCA although it will take a while to regain its credibility to run the new kindergarten. Meanwhile, YMCA will create more community-based programs and for that a new staff may be recruited soon.

Partners Support Group (PSG) members of Indonesia YMCA includes Australia (Victoria Y), Japan, Singapore (Metropolitan Y), Philippines, Holland and APAY.
