1. From the Desk of the General Secretary...27th Advanced Studies Programme

We had the 27th Advanced Studies from Oct 26 to Nov. 28, for 35 days in YMCA Wu Kwai Sha Youth Village, Hong Kong. 11 participants from 9 countries participated. They were from China, Hong Kong (2), Japan, Korea (Timor Leste), Myanmar (2), Philippines, India, Bangladesh, and Sri Lanka. They learned from various resource persons, shared experiences and opinions, went on field studies, and thought and questioned the values of YMCAs, etc. Finally all participants wrote and presented a proposal each on a challenging area of work, that he /she faced and impacted.

Being together for one month, we realized that we are working in very different social and cultural backgrounds and so are our programs very wide range. So many unique individuals, some strong and challenging all the time, some quiet and rather watching and listening to the others, and some always being and going my pace. It is really interesting to see dynamism of people working together in the YMCA. We are not at all the same but something there to bind us together. We are struggling for our own survival but at the same time we exist for the others who are suffering and who are weak in our society. In the proposal writing, every participant thought their targets as migrants who are treated unfairly, migrants being looked down by neighbouring people, youth who are looking for any opportunity to get their lives little better, people in constant conflict, youth and children who are not open their minds to outside world, autistic children who are not given proper education for their needs, etc. Hearing all of those proposals, I really felt this is the basis of YMCA spirit.



One Bangladesh staff spoke about the situation of the women in his country. Men can marry several women, but women are strictly confined in the community and watched by their people. According to our HUMAN RIGHTS concern, this is not acceptable at all. However, at the same time, women in their society have been protected very well from society even they live in poor and sometimes very violent social conditions. That custom comes from their cultural background. It is a local wisdom. One lady has been working in the Timor Leste (East

Timor) YMCA for nearly three years, and feels that the local people have their local wisdom to manage everyday lives. The country is one of the smallest and newest in the world and has been going through a lot of conflict from outside as well as within themselves. People are used to assistance from INGOs (International NGOs) and of course village people always seek for whatever YMCA does for them. They have been struggling for their YMCA sustainability but are still far behind. Being there as an assistant in such country, she feels local wisdom, which is not easily seen by foreigners who visit for a few days. The YMCA work should be coming from understanding this local wisdom, I thought from her talk.

Here is a good message introduced by Song Jin Ho (Senior Executive Director of NCY Korea) when he concluded his input. Some of you may have heard about it which is taken from the credo of rural reconstruction ~ "Go to the people. Live among them. Learn from them. Plan with them. Work with them. Start with what they know. Build in what they have."

Being a YMCA staff, I should be always humble and listen to people and God's voice.

3. Recently Held ~ Workshop on Gender Concerns and Migration



Twenty-five select participants from the YMCAs of Bangladesh, Indonesia, Japan, Malaysia, Myanmar, Philippines, Singapore, Thailand and Vietnam were together for this workshop in Metro YMCA Singapore. Starting off with the Communities of Practice, good practices were shared from the YMCAs of Kaligram, Bangladesh; Chiang Rai, Thailand; NCY Japan and NCY Myanmar. There were 2 major components of this programme ~ gender concerns and migration. Dr. Patcharawan Srisilapanan, APAY Gender Equity (GE) Committee presented a summary of the analysis/outcome of the GE Survey 2009.

The participants actively shared self-assessment and constructive critiquing in their own YMCAs and

clarified their own PCGs ~ progress, gaps and challenges. Collectively, they were able to create some concrete follow-up actions/initiatives towards greater responsiveness and gender balance in our YMCA's life, expression and Mission.

Keeping us updated on the complex issues of migration/migrant work, Mr. Rex Varona, Executive Director of the Asian Migrant Center (AMC) provided the necessary input and clearer understanding of Migration and Development. The General Manager of UNIFEM Singapore shared about their responses and advocacy programmes on the issue. Participants indeed appreciated the exposures specially arranged in PAVE (Centre for Promoting Alternatives to Violence) and in HOME (Humanitarian Organisation for Migration Economics). All participants actively engaged themselves in work group discussions. They shared and formulated mutual support programmes/practical actions among (YMCA) sending and receiving countries. All recommendations shall be circulated to the Movements early next year. The workshop was held from 14-17 December 2009.

Our sincere appreciation to Metropolitan YMCA Singapore for hosting the workshop and our thanks to YMCA of Singapore for extending also its support. Special gratitude to the GE Committee Working Group.

4. Global Warming Forum To Develop YMCA Response

The Forum on Global Warming on 18-22 January 2010 at Christ Church, New Zealand will bring together YMCA members from across the region to discuss about global warming and the impact realities of climate change. It will also serve as an important regional platform for YMCAs to enter into discussion on positioning YMCAs stance on Global Warming and strategise its involvements in addressing this issue. Ms. Lister Cheung, an environmental expert from Hong Kong who attended the Copenhagen Climate Conference representing APAY will share about the concerns from the UN Climate Conference and will facilitate a workshop in the forum. Apart from the inputs through keynote address, theological underpinning through eco- theological reflections, case stories and good practices from different YMCAs and other community based organisations, brainstorming group works, eco – tour to witness sustainable practices will lead towards developing framework for a common action plan for the YMCAs in the Region. *The deadline for Registration for participating in the forum will be 31 December 2009*.
